DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

Who we are, where we come from and go to, these are philosophical questions without an ever satisfying explanation. But simplified, broken down to only relate to ourselves, these questions are a lot easier to answer.

I was always interested in the role of origin, family history, and the impact our parents have on us. As son of a Dutch mother and a Nigerian father, I know too well what it is like to grow up between two cultures and the feeling that I don't really belong anywhere- a poignant contradiction that forms the core of the problem of the main character in Femi.

Femi creates a bridge between social and magical realism. It is a story about a boy fighting a battle with his demons. To him, suicide is the only way to beat them. In addition to a gripping character study, I wanted to give the audience an emotional experience, recognizable and encouraging for anyone who has had that struggle before.
